Urgent & final reminder! Abstracts close on <u>15 October 2024</u> for 5th ISA Forum, Rabat, Morocco (July 2025)

Abstracts are now open for the 5th ISA Forum in Rabat, Morocco, 6-11 July 2025 and close in 2 weeks (15 October). Please note that there can be **no extension** to this deadline. RC44 is involved in multiple sessions at next year's ISA Forum (see the full list below). We encourage members and supporters to submit abstracts for these sessions. For more information on how to submit your abstract, please read the information below. Please also note that the conference is in-person only—there will be no online or hybrid sessions. Key Points for Submission

For submitting your abstract, you should prepare:

- 1. Title
- 2. **Keywords** Up to four custom keywords.
- 3. **Author(s)** Presenting author and any co-authors. There is a limit of seven (7) authors.
- 4. **Abstract** Abstract text may not exceed 300 words and can be entered in either English, French or Spanish. Please review the languages accepted in the session you want to submit for.

Duties and Deadlines

- Abstracts Submission Closes: October 15, 2024 No deadline extensions.
- Abstracts Selection Closes: November 10, 2024
- Abstract Relocation Closes: November 30, 2024
- Notification of Acceptance: December 5, 2024

Rules for all presenters

- All abstracts must be submitted in English, French or Spanish. Please review the languages accepted in the session you want to submit for.
- There is a limit of seven (7) authors per abstract.
- Authors and co-authors cannot present and chair in the same session. Please note that session organizer and chair does not need to be the same person.

Alexander GALLAS (2024). Exiting the Factory: Strikes and class formation beyond the industrial sector. Bristol: Bristol University Press.

Written in two volumes, this important book asks what strikes in non-industrial sectors mean for class formation, a critical question which has largely been unaddressed by the current literature on global labour unrest. A mapping of strikes around the world and case studies from Germany, Britain and Spain cast new light on class relations, struggles around waged and unwaged work and labour movements in contemporary capitalism to bring class theory back to labour studies.
